




















## RESTAURANT 91LIGENCE

Boniface bridge was a bridge we stood on to watch the canal boats go by. The area had over-hanging half-timbered houses and a view of the Church of Our Lady.


THE BELFORT

They contained informational panels to read through and learn about the Belfort. My biggest tip would be to definitely bring water with you.


The view from the top level was breath-taking. Every so often the big bell would loudly ring.











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
